RULES AND REGULATIONS

EXHIBIT HALL HOURS ARE 10:00AM - 10:00PM

(1:00PM - 10:00PM ON SUNDAY)

- Delivery trucks will not be allowed on concession grounds after 10:00am each morning.
- 2. The Board reserves the right to make changes they deem necessary in premiums as stated in the premium book.
- 3. All open class Livestock Exhibitors must pay into the treasury an exhibitor fee of three (\$3.00) dollars which shall entitle such exhibitors to enter animals for competition. Livestock exhibitors must pay per head/stall/pen fees as indicated. All Open Youth Livestock Exhibitors from ages 13-15, by this payment, will receive a weekly walk-in pass, unless a pass is issued by the Youth Fair department.
- 4. **Still Exhibits** All exhibitors entering Still Exhibits must pay the exhibitors fee as indicated below. The number of articles entered may be a combination of several departments.

Entry Fee \$10.00 Per Exhibitor

All exhibitors by this payment will receive one admission ticket given by department staff upon presenting article(s) for competition. Exhibitors may enter articles or animals for competition subject to the rules and regulations of this Society except as otherwise provided.

- 5. Late entries may be accepted if space is available. \$25 in addition to the regular entry fees is required. Entries received after 4:00PM, September 2, 2025, or post marked after September 2, 2025, are considered late.
- No articles can be entered except in the name of the bona fide owner. Ownership is not required for an exhibitor to show in any animal classes other than market classes.
- 7. The entry books will be open by the first business day in August, at the office on the grounds, and each day thereafter until the entries close.
- Society reserves the right to reject entries when available space in buildings is taken, or for any other reasonable cause.
- The Society will not accept exhibits unless accompanied by exhibitor or attendant.
- 10. No bull shall be allowed to enter the grounds or remain thereon without safely secured and in charge of a person to manage it, and if over one year old, without a substantial ring in the nose.
- Any exhibitor in any department interfering in any way with the decision of the judge shall forfeit all rights to premium.
- 12. The Society will furnish no forage or straw for any show classes of stock. Exhibitors will see to the watering and feeding of their own stock.

- 13. No animal or article shall be removed from the grounds before 10:00PM on the closing day of the fair, except on written permit of the superintendent of the department.
- 14. Any person violating any of the rules of the Society, or any exhibitor attempting to deceive the Superintendent or Judge of any department as to age, ownership or eligibility of any animal, or bird, or the ineligibility of any article to compete for premiums under the rules of the Society, shall forfeit his or her right to compete for premiums.
- 15. The Board of Directors may impose any form of discipline that it deems appropriate for a violation of the Articles, By-Laws, rules, or regulations of the Society.
- 16. It shall be the duty of the division superintendent to take charge of arranging the articles of their respective divisions, to keep order, and assist in the care of the property in their divisions, and to assist the judges in keeping their books, attaching premium cards, or ribbons, and return the record of awards to the Secretary.
- 17. The Superintendent of safety shall have the entire supervision of the police and marshals and shall have the power to establish such police arrangements as he or she may deem necessary. It shall be the duty of the police and marshals to execute the orders they may receive from time to time from the superintendent of safety, guard against the infringement of any rule, the jumping of fences, or driving automobiles, golf carts or motorized vehicles on the track or grounds without permission. A golf cart permit must be obtained from the fair office. A fee of \$50 and proof of insurance is required.
- 18. The superintendent will carefully make record in the entry books of their respective departments of all awards on articles or animals. A premium card or ribbon placed on the exhibit is no guarantee of awards. It is governed by the records in the Judge's books.
- 19. Judges will in no case award a premium where there is evident fraud in entry, or the articles or animals are not worthy, neither will they award two premiums to an exhibitor on articles competing, except in selected sections in Departments 1 to 19.
- 20. Judges will not recommend or make awards on more articles or animals than there are premiums offered in the official printed list unless authorized by Superintendent and Secretary.
- 21. The records of awards as offered in the official premium list and returned by the superintendents and judges of different departments shall be authority recognized by the Secretary in drawing premium orders.
- 22. The payment of premiums will commence on Monday AM of fair week or thereafter as soon as possible and continue through October following each annual fair. Checks may be issued during fair week for horse, pony and farm tractor pulls
- 23. Premium checks will be sent by mail to exhibitors. Premium checks must be cashed within 90 days. Those checks not cashed within 90 days of date of issue shall be considered as a donation to the Hillsdale County Agricultural Society, subject to Michigan Unclaimed Property Law.

- 24. PROTEST All protest must be made in writing and state the specific cause of the complaint or appeal. Any exhibitor may file a complaint regarding any of the following:
- (a) Conflict of interest of the judge
- (b) Disqualification of an exhibit or exhibitor
- (c) Exhibitor, group leader or superintendent behavior
- (d) Eligibility of exhibit.

The result of the decision by the judge(s) is final. Exhibitors have 10 days from the close of the fair to file a complaint or appeal with the Fair Office. All protests will be considered by the Board of Directors at the October or December meeting following each annual fair. The Board of Directors will then issue a notice recommending action on the findings. The exhibitor has 45 days from the date that the complaint was filed with the fair to file an appeal with the Department of Agriculture. The department has 60 days to investigate the appeal and issue a report on the findings. In each case of protest the party protesting must deposit with the superintendent of their department the sum of \$25, which sum shall, in the event of the protest being sustained, be returned to the complainant, and if the protest shall not be sustained, then said sum shall be forfeited.

- 25. Reasonable care will be taken of all articles and animals on exhibition, but in no case will the Society be responsible for any loss or damage to the same.
- 26. The Hillsdale County Agricultural Society maintains what is considered an adequate police force and night watch on the grounds but does not assume any responsibility for loss or damage of goods or exhibits by fire or theft and upon these condition entries will be received.
- 27. No roaming solicitations allowed including leaflets, flyers, or distribution of any materials.
- 28. No Bicycles, Rollerblades, Roller Skates and Skateboards are permitted on the grounds during fair week. All Alcoholic Beverages are prohibited on the fairgrounds, except at special events where alcoholic beverage use has been approved by the Board of Directors.
- 29. Reptiles or animals are not allowed on the fairgrounds during fair week unless the animal has been preregistered as part of an entertainment show, a youth fair division animal, an open class animal, pulling contest animal, and animal registered with a party camping on the fairgrounds, an animal with the Sheriff Mounted Division, an animal being used by a person under the American Disability Act or an animal or reptile approved by the Manager of the fair.
- 30. Ribbons and Rosettes will be awarded for all places as listed for each class, unless otherwise specified.
- 31. CATTLE Refer to the cattle section of the MDARD Health Requirements for Bovine Tuberculosis (TB) & RFID electronic tags regulations.
- 32. SHEEP & GOATS Refer to the sheep and goat section of the MDARD Health Requirements for scrapie's tagging regulations.
- 33. EQUINE except foals under six (6) months and nursing their dam must present proof of a negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test conducted within the 12 previous months and have papers checked prior to unloading. Refer to Equine section of the MDARD Health Requirements for further regulations.

- 34. DRUG TESTING POLICY Any animal entered in any class at the fair may be subjected to drug testing at the discretion of the Fair Manager, Superintendent, or his/her designated representative. The Fair's veterinarian/authorized representative may collect urine, blood hair and/or other test samples for cause. Refer to Livestock Sample Collection Procedures in this premium book for details.
- 35. Open Class premiums shall not be awarded in an animal class where an exhibitor is less than 6 years of age by December 31 of the fair exhibition year.
- 36. OPEN CLASS YOUTH AGE POLICY Participants are limited to youth who are 19 years of age by December 31 of the fair/exposition year or younger.
- 37. YOUTH FAIR AGE POLICY Refer to Youth Fair Department Premium book for eligibility requirements.
- The Fair reserves the right to photograph and record your exhibits.

- Use the entry form enclosed with premium book or request entry forms from the Fair Office. Photocopies are acceptable. Please use two entry forms when entering both livestock and still exhibits.
- 2. Write your name and address plainly.
- 3. Make entries conform to premium list rules and classifications.
- 4. Give department, division, class, and description of entry.
- 5. In livestock entries, give age, sex and breed required by premium book rules.
- 6. Send list by mail as early as possible, including entry and stall or pen fees as listed in premium book. All animals and articles must be in place for judging by the times listed at the beginning of each department.
- 7. Read the rules in the premium book.
- 8. Make all entries according to the rules of the department.
- 9. Livestock entries close when filled by no later than the entry deadline for Open Class. Late entries may be accepted if space allows, subject to a late fee of \$25, plus entry fees.

Rules:

- Entries close August 29, 2025.
- Entry Fee \$5.00 per head and a one-time livestock 2. exhibitor fee of \$3.00 must be sent with entry form.
- In Place Sunday, September 21, 2025, at Noon.
- Judging Thursday, September 25, 2025, at 9:00am. Removal After 10:00pm on closing day of Fair.
- The Society will not furnish hav or bedding for stock.
- All cattle entered must be eligible to register in a recognized herd book; exhibitors must furnish certificates of registry for all animals over one year of age, as well as certificates of transfer when not bred by exhibitor, if requested to do so by the Superintendent.
- Quality of animals and fitness for breeding (meaning neither too fat or too lean nor showing signs of bareness, with justness of proportion), to be considered, next after establishing purity of blood.
- All cows, 2 years old or over, shall show signs of producing a calf within 9 months.
- 10. Only one herd shall be shown by the same exhibitor where there is no competition.
- 11. Animals may be shown for both single and herd premiums.
- 12. Animals competing for sweepstakes will be allowed to compete for single premiums.
- 13. First and second place winners qualify to show for champion and reserve champion.
- 14. If animals and stalls are not kept clean and bedded, premiums may be withheld.
- 15. An Exhibitor is not entitled to draw more than two moneys in any individual class and only one money in group classes.
- 16. Any stall not occupied by livestock may be used for bedding and supplies with approval from the department superintendent.
- 17. All cattle moving to a show, sale or exhibition are required to have an official RFID ear tag. Refer to the MDARD Health requirements in this premium book for further information.

- 5. Removal After 10:00pm on closing day of Fair.
- All cattle shown except in group classes must be property of the exhibitor when entered.
- 7. All beef breeding cattle entered must be eligible to be registered. Exhibitors must furnish certificates of registration for all animals, if requested to do so by the Superintendent. We recognize the beef industry has crossbred cattle for many years and would honor crossbred calves from registered dams.
- First & second place winners qualify to show for Champion and Reserve Champion.
- If animals and stalls are not kept clean and bedded, premiums may be withheld.
- 10. Dry cows must have weaned calf by side.
- An exhibitor is not entitled to draw more than two moneys in any individual class and only one money in group classes.
- 12. Any stall not occupied by livestock may be used for bedding and supplies with the approval of the Superintendent.
- 13. All cattle moving to a show, sale or exhibition are required to have an official RFID ear tag. Refer to the MDARD Health requirements in this premium book for further information.
- 14. Showmanship classes will be done at the end of the beef show. Sign up on show day. Classes will be split by the Superintendent. Ribbons only.

Rules:

- 1. Entries close August 29, 2025.
- 2. Entry Fee \$2.00 per head and a one-time Livestock Exhibitor fee of \$3.00 must be sent with entry.
- 3. In place Sunday morning, September 21, 2025.
- 4. Judging Wednesday, September 24, 2025, at 9am.
- 5. Removal After 10:00pm on closing day of fair.
- 6. The Society will furnish no hay or bedding for stock.
- The date for computing the age of sheep is September 1st, except for junior lambs which are born after January 1st.
- 8. Market lamb judging will be at NOON ON SHOW DAY.
- 9. All sheep must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor at the time of making entry.
- 10. No animals shall be entered for more than one Premium except in flocks.
- 11. All sheep entered must be eligible to registry in a recognized flock book. Exhibitors must be prepared to furnish a certificate of registry of all animals over 1 year of age, and certificate of transfer if not bred by exhibitor, if requested to do so by the Superintendent (Exception: Section 41).
- 12. Wether Type Breeding Sheep are limited to entries in Section 41 only.
- 13. All sheep/goats moved within Michigan shall be identified with official USDA scrapie program identification program tags prior to movement off the farm. Contact the USDA at 866-873-2824 for ear tags. Refer to the MDARD Health Regulations for updated information.
 - a. USDA Official Ear Tag tagged in either ear OR
 - b. USDA Official Ear Tag number tattooed in the ear, flank, or tail web. If tattooed, the end of the Scrapie tag should be cut off so it can't be reused. The cut Scrapie tag must be carried with the goat whenever it is moved. OR
 - c. USDA approved breed association registry tattoo. The breed registration certificate, which includes the tattoo characters, must accompany the goat when moved. USDA approved breed association include: the American Boer Goat Association, the American Dairy Goat Association, the American Goat Society, the Cashmere Goat Registry, the International Boer Goat Association, the International Fainting Goat Association, the National Pygmy Goat Association, the Nigerian Dwarf Goat Association, the Pedigree International, and the Pygora Breeders Association. OR

 - e. Sheep that are part of the USDA Scrapie Flock Certification Program can use the Scrapie Flock Certification Program tag. OR
 - f. Sheep that are part of the USDA Scrapie Flock Certification Program tag in the ear or flank. If tattooed, the tag must be carried with the animal whenever it is moved.
- 14. An exhibitor is not entitled to draw more than two moneys in any one class and only one money in group classes.
